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**Objective:** Explain what social/global issues that this project tried to address and why the issue is important.

#### Background

Social issues that arise from the world require multiple disciplines to act cooperatively and scientific research and development cannot solve the issues itself. It requires ethical, social, legal implications as well as economical implications and issues to identify and solve social issues. In Japan, the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT) have identified that the training of students to be aware of the interdisciplinary issues are going to be essential in solving problems of tomorrow, which led to the creation of programmes for Leading Graduate Schools (LGS), lead by Japan Society of Promotion of Science (JSPS).

#### Problem identification

Our LGS, GSDM (Global Leader Program for Social Design and Management), consists of students affiliated with 9 schools across 21 departments in The University of Tokyo. The programme aims to educate students beyond their major and to encourage their research considering social issues in terms of academia, industry and government, and its structure is novel to the university and brings new challenges the management of the whole system. One of the major challenges identified is the lack of engagement between students and staff, which is essential to coordinate the programme.

#### Objectives

In this SIP, we set our objective to increase the chances of success in interdisciplinary education and to improve the quality of "Programmes for Leading Graduate Schools" beyond GSDM. Initially, we started with the investigation of the GSDM itself, in order to deal with matters arising within the programme and to promote the activities. Then, we set and implement methods to increase the chances of success. Also, we interview with members in other all-round leading graduate schools and compare their methods.

Through investigation of the past and current failures of GSDM, we considered that it is an important assignment to increase the chances of communication among students and between them and faculty members. In order to achieve it, we secured a channel to connect students and faculty members for the exchange of opinions. Then, we implemented activities to promote the communication. At the same time, we surveyed the satisfaction about the programme for GSDM students. Finally, we interviewed with students belonging to other LGS, compared our methods with theirs, and analysed the requirement for success of interdisciplinary education. The list of the implemented methods are as follows:

**Outcome:** Explain what kind of results you obtained from this project and discuss how it addressed your focal social/global issues.

Results obtained:

1. Improvement of communication
  - a. Firstly, we introduced “Slack” app to improve the communication, that currently have 117 members with 32 that are active. Secondly, we regularly attended and commented at the Tokunin- student meetings, that were held every month.
  - b. In addition, we extensively broadened our network of students through participation to inter-programme LGS events including, 4th Student meeting held in Makuhari, gathering with Waseda, Keio and Ochanomizu University students, gathering following AR7 (All-round 7) event in Kyoto and interviews. By improving communication inside and outside of the programme has allowed a platform to discuss about other leading graduate school programmes.
2. Analysis of the current situation with calls for action
  - a. Firstly, we performed a questionnaire to the current students in the GSDM in July and conducted a first ever students’ meeting in September, allowing us to analyse the current situation of GSDM.
  - b. Secondly, we interviewed students from other universities that allowed more through analysis to identify the common problems of the LGS. The interviews were very informative that allowed us to identify strengths and weakness of each programmes and identify the common flaws. In majority of programmes, students encountered lack of evaluation and feedback, which this programme have a room for improvement.
  - c. Lastly, we discussed about matters arising to the Tokunin faculties in length every month and discussed on the implementation. Through the meetings, we managed to pass some proposals to the steering committee to decide. Through these analysis and actions, we believe that we have made a valuable contributions to the GSDM.
3. Experience of Group management
  - a. This experience was the first time for individuals in the group to manage a group of over 100 students, where the issues directly affect ourselves. Through the management exercise, we experienced real hand the tough challenge to motivate people and move a group of individuals. Through the experience, we learnt the methodologies that could be used to improve the situation as a group.
  - b. Lastly, through the project, we learnt about the communication strategies to gather opinions, write many proposals that could influence the way an organisation is run. It allowed us to have a valuable experience to manage group of people.

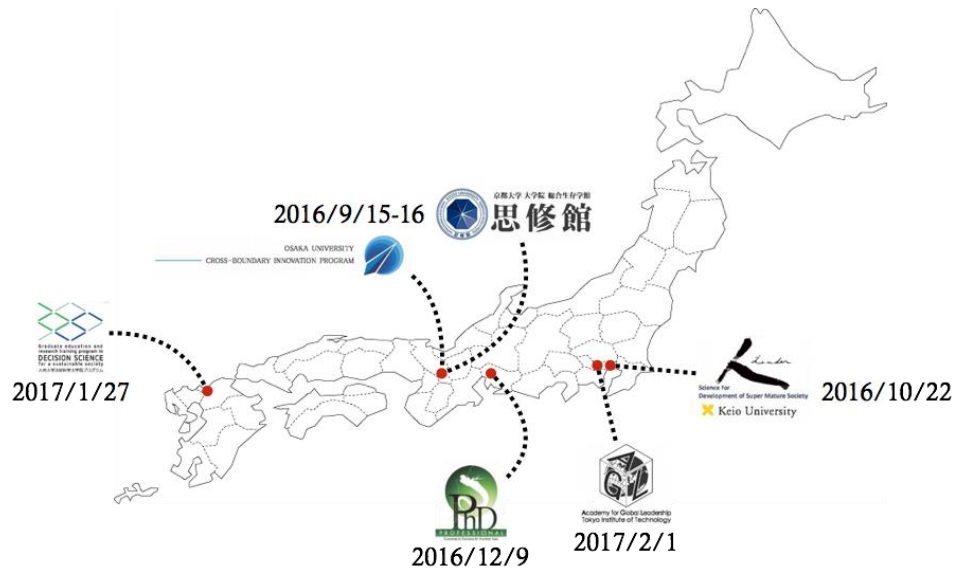


Fig. Overview of interviews

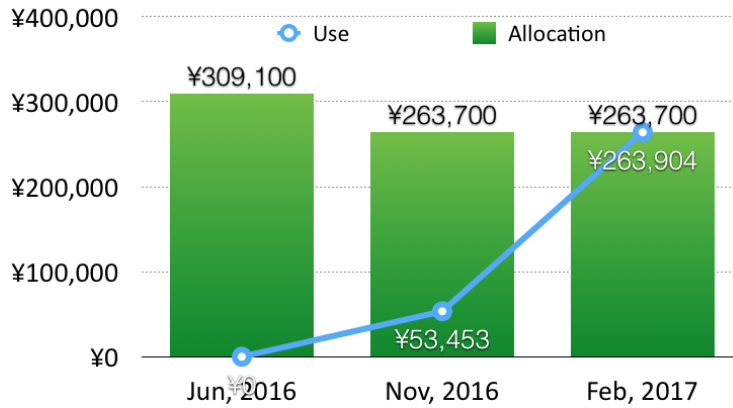

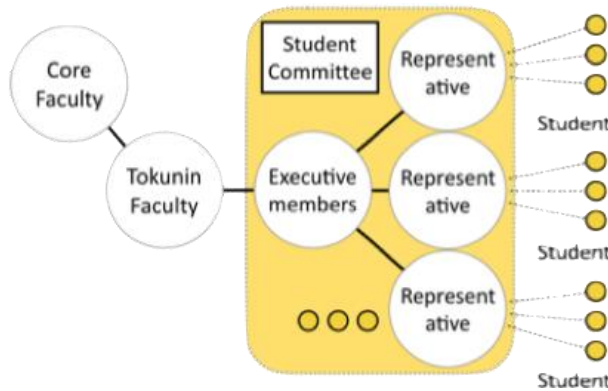


Figure 1. Structure of new students' committee
